# Acid Horizon Reading Group: The Accursed Share Volume I, II and III (Fall 2022 through 2023)

- "... it is not necessity but its contrary, "luxury", that presents living matter and mankind with their fundamental problems." Georges Bataille, The Accursed Share: Volume 1 (Pg. 12)

Following our Bataille In Context summer reading group we will now begin to work through the text that Bataille is perhaps most known for, *The Accursed Share*, which will take us through a historical account of ecology, expenditure, scarcity, and what Bataille calls the "general economy". Here Bataille attempts to close the (perhaps theological) divide between the "gift" societies of anthropology and "monetized" societies of economics by highlighting the refrain of expenditure throughout both in history. In the book we will explore Native American, Muslim, and East Asian societies as well as what Bataille considers to be the origins of capitalism and its relation to the protestant reformation up until the more recent era, where we will look at the Soviet Union and the United States' Marshall Plan.

The stakes for this group will continue over from the Bataille In Context reading group - the political decisions of scarcity, the necessity of expenditure, and the important relation of both to kinship and civilization as a whole. We will attempt to answer some leftover questions from the previous readings: *How do we create a community? How can we become sovereign? Do we need myth? What on earth is "erotic philosophy"?*. The book will ultimately prepare us to take up Bataille's The Accursed Share Volumes 2&3, which expand upon the premises laid out in the first volume but take us closer to his political and theological projects.

#### Structure //

The sessions will be broken up into the same 5 sections that Bataille breaks his book out into in addition to secondary readings taken from anthropology, sociology, economics, and history that either compliment or provide tension with Bataille's major claims. We will still deal with similar topics as the last reading groups: excess and luxury, scarcity and utility, transgression and taboo, limit-experiences, eroticism, community and communication, sovereignty, religion, and many more.

### Readings //

Readings include the main text of The Accursed Share with **supplementary** papers to help guide the discussion or highlight major examples. Papers are taken from recommendations made in the discord, Noah's exposure to resources in the Mimbres School seminars, and general research in and around the realm of critical theory. ALL READINGS WILL BE POSTED IN THE DISCORD AND RELEVANT SESSION'S READING FOLDER.
