How to articulate your bends

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For this lesson we will be working with the E minor pentatonic scale, so these ideas will sound great in an E minor chord progression or an E blues, let's look at the shape we are working with.

The most important, bending in tune. Note how we bend the $5^{\rm th}$ fret of the E string, an A note, up to sound just like the $7^{\rm th}$ fret of the E string, or the B note. Your bent note should sound just like it would had you fretted it two frets up.

Lets look at some licks.

Lick 1 - These licks don't have time because I want you to feel free to use them with the rhythm that you want. Note the bends, it says 5b7 because you want to bend the $5^{\rm th}$ fret (A note) up to the $7^{\rm th}$ note (B note) but it is all done in one pluck

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Lick 2 - The Bend and Release - In this lick note the 5b7r5 the idea is to bend up to the 7^{th} fret but than back to the 5^{th} in the same pluck.

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Licks 3 - Pre-bend lick, the idea is to bend to the $7^{\rm th}$ fret, strike the note, and than bend down. So the listener only hears the note bending down and not up.
